

A mother and daughter's counselling journey

"My daughter Bella (15) has always been strong willed, a risk taker and a little rebellious. The serious rebellion kicked in with truancy. Bella had been arriving at school late almost everyday. When Bella began skipping classes in the middle of the day the school counsellor believed that she might be suffering from depression. After some counselling at the Kari Centre it was determined that she was not depressed. This left me with the question "why was Bella being truant?"

Bella began sneaking out in the middle of the night. I panicked. While on the phone with the police - Bella just walked in through the front door as if nothing was wrong. The next day I was on the phone to Home and Family Counselling. It would be a month before an appointment became available. In that interim Bella continued to sneak out of the house at night, putting herself in ever increasing danger, not caring about the consequences.

Previously harmless teenage outbursts became violent attacks at everyone in our family.

I couldn't sleep. As far as she was concerned, Bella didn't have a family. I had reduced my working hours to supervise Bella's attendance to and from school. My sons Alex (17) and Jack (14) had become so frustrated that they were just waiting for something bad to happen.



If one more thing went wrong I would have given up completely.

But I knew that Bella had not come to this space all by herself and that working through this was more than I could handle alone.

At the first day with the Home and Family Counselling appointment I felt anxious. I had been a child of violence, a daughter of abuse, a ward of the state and not accustomed to trusting anyone, but the counsellor, Anya put me at ease. After conveying my relationship with Bella, my fears for her safety and the pressures this had all placed upon our family, Anya

discussed a plan to begin sessions with Bella and myself.

I wasn't sure if Bella would be cooperative but she was happy to return for weekly appointments.

We needed a clear head to mediate between us, and that was what Anya did. She helped me to put into clearer focus where things had gone off track and why.

I could see that at counselling, Bella had been learning ways to curb her outbursts. We weren't always successful, but we kept trying.

This time last year, I would have said that we were losing Bella and had no idea how to get her back. Now I can say that life is better, and we are taking it one day at a time. I can say that Bella is no longer truant. Bella is spending more time with the family talking and laughing over the silliest of things.

Though it is winter outside, inside spring has come early with only the occasional overcast day.

That works for me. And I am happy to say that it is working for our family also."

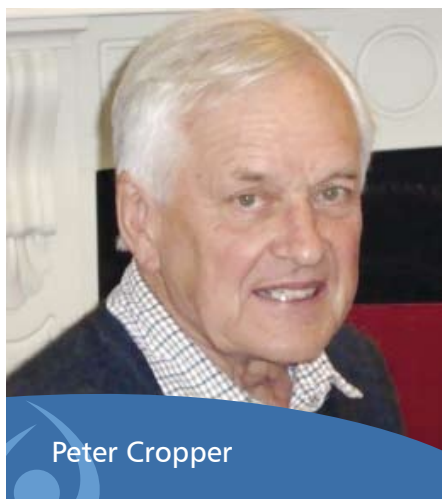

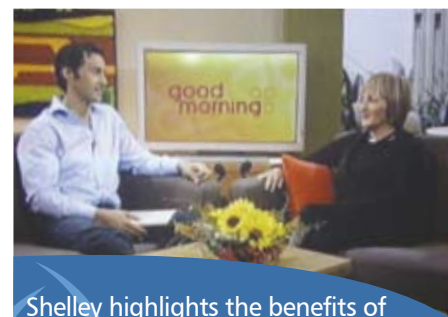
She applauded the role of community services and acknowledged the importance of counselling for the

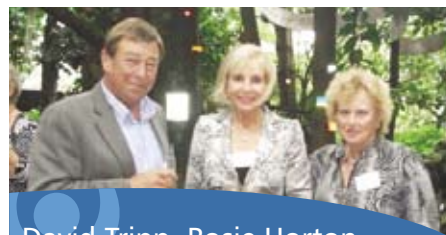
