A major achievement of this past year has been the completion of the long awaited alterations to our Mt Eden premises resulting in an additional and more welcoming meeting room and additional counselling room. Much work went into the raising of the funds for this undertaking, and in particular we are grateful for the substantial grant extended to us by the ASB Trust.

Earlier in the year under review, the Executive Committee, with input from the active staff, spent a one day retreat to prepare the outline of a Strategic Plan from 2005 until 2008. This was duly finished by Mary Gray, our director, and ratified by the Executive Committee. It is now a documented plan for our goals over the three years ahead. Besides being reviewed each month this plan will undergo updating as to the circumstances each year.

The North Shore centre is now firmly established in the community, and has achieved financial viability. Looking ahead, the Society has solid support on board to sustain itself, but the problem of funding is constant and requires persistent effort to attract the necessary grants and especially the individual contributions. Mary Gray and her staff are presently working on plans for improving and increasing this financial support.

I am very pleased to acknowledge and thank our two Supporters groups, the well established and consistent contributor group from Auckland and the fledgling group on the North Shore. This latter group held its first major event, a champagne party at the Clifftop house of Karen and Dennis Jones, whose hospitality we are most grateful for. The Auckland Supporters group contributed a welcome \$14,605 to the Society this year and the North Shore group contributed \$14,522, confirming their valuable work getting established there.

Reining in and controlling expenses involves constant vigilance, especially in the face of constantly increasing costs. Indemnity insurance costs and audit requirements have grown in the last couple of years, and previous rates subsidies are much reduced. As well, greater demands on Funding Trusts makes for greater challenges in sustaining the financial inflow to meet our budget.

I extend my thanks for the staunch support given to me by the Executive Committee members. I also wish to acknowledge and thank Mary Gray, the administrative staff and our counsellors for the exceptionally high level of commitment they always display and which results in the excellent service the Society has provided our community for 113 years.

Results

Client satisfaction is a key measure for us of our results. Each quarter we seek feedback from current clients through an anonymous questionnaire, about how they are finding both the counselling they are receiving and other aspects of our service.

We receive high satisfaction rates with usually over 80% of clients finding their counselling either ‘quite’ or ‘very’ helpful.

Suggestions on how we can improve our services are also sought. A typical response to this is: *‘Nothing. I find the services excellent and very professional.’*

Expanding our Mt Eden premises

Last winter saw the Mt Eden office turned into a building site as the Mainzeal gang pushed out walls and windows and put in others. We were all very impressed by the men at work and thrilled with the end result of more useful rooms and space. An additional counselling room, separate group room, an additional toilet and reconfigured waiting area, and extra administration space all help to deliver better services to our clients.

A wide range of services and sponsors have made these renovations possible and are deserving of our thanks, especially Mainzeal, our contractors, John Sinclair, our architect from Architectus, and Kamal Chaudary, who drafted our plans. Special thanks to our major financial donors the ASB Charitable Trust which donated \$35,000 and ARA Lodge No 348 Charitable Trust (\$25,000). A significant donation was also given by the Riverside Trust. We were also thrilled by the wide personal response to our appeals from individual supporters, which has enabled us to fully pay for these renovations.

‘Our counsellor has helped us to talk about our anger, and our family is happier. This is a relief to us all. Our counsellor is like an angel from heaven and helps us all.’

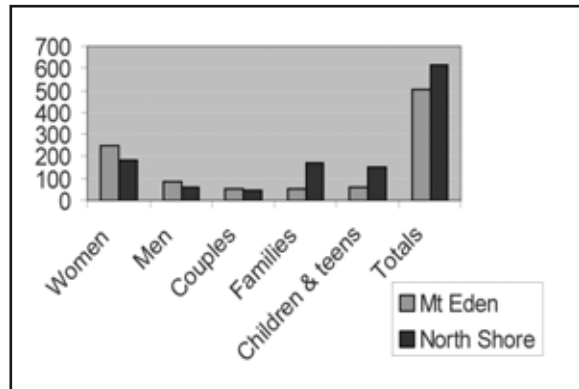

Our core work with individual women and men

Work at Glenfield has expanded over the year as a result of full staffing there. The team saw 616 clients, completing 2857 interviews. This is an average of 5 sessions per client, compared with 501 clients seen at Mt Eden over 3627 interviews (averaging 7 sessions per client).

Counselling to women and men formed the main part of the counsellors' work. The Mt Eden team saw 248 women (50% of their work) and 87 men (17%) and North Shore counsellors saw 184 women (30%) and 62 men (10%).

At Glenfield, the team completed work with 172 families, 28% of their work for the year. 57 children and teens were seen at Mt Eden and 153 at Glenfield, reflecting the fact that all the counsellors in the team there work with children whereas only two of the Mt Eden counsellors did so.



Media and Publicity

A major publicity focus in the last year has seen Home and Family Society featured 13 times in the local media, the Aucklander (Central, East and North) and the Central Leader. Radio coverage of events has also been received.

We have been fortunate to have international film maker Scott Walker, produce a **television advertisement**



for Home and Family Society. We have tapped community slots in TV3 and Prime TV to air the advertisements since October 2005.

Group Programmes

Teen Groups

Young people on the North Shore continue to benefit from the groups that the team there run in some of the High Schools. This year 33 girls have attended the *Respectful Relationships* groups. The tragic suicide of a teenage girl on the North Shore, who had experienced verbal and text bullying from classmates highlights how relevant are the issues this programme addresses. 20 boys and girls have attended the *Anger with Aggro* groups, another programme addressing key current social problems for teens.

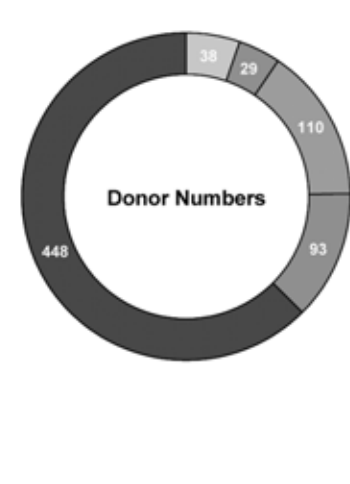
Chinese Solo Mother's Group

An exciting development this year has been our *Chinese Solo Mothers* group programme that Joy Tai, our Chinese counsellor has run. Joy had identified that isolation and stigma were quite a problem for many solo mothers she was seeing. 22 women have attended two programmes which the women have loved.

New Migrant Group

Estelle Mendelsohn and her team continue to run our *New Start* programme for immigrant women. 20 women from a variety of different communities including Iraq, Iran, India, South Africa, Russia and Afghanistan attended two programmes.

The year has been marked by two significant experiences, the first operating loss for some years and the completion of the building extensions at Mt Eden after some years of planning. The two events have impacted in different ways in the accounts and need some elaboration for readers to understand what they are reading.

The reported surplus for the year is \$43,759 but this is after special donations of \$75,000 from a small number of benefactors towards the cost of the building extensions. This money has been fully utilized and is not available for the day to day operations of the Society.

The operating deficit in the year was \$31,241 and this is of concern to the Executive Committee. Client Donations and Grants have increased but allowing for the special donations mentioned above, donations overall have decreased by \$49,000 compared with 2005. A factor of concern is that wages have increased by \$35,000 in the year without a proportionate increase in revenue overall.

The building extensions and some additional office furniture and equipment have increased depreciation but while this is significant by comparison with the previous year, is not a major cost overall.

It is imperative that there be a closer matching of costs with revenue which is easy to say but hard to achieve. The Director and Executive Committee are fully aware of the challenge and the need for action to remedy this situation. We are grateful for the ongoing support of a number of organizations and mention especially Child Youth and Family Services and the ASB Trust.

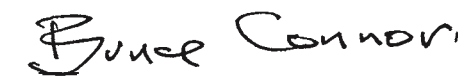

Notes to the Financial Statements

For The Year Ended 31 March 2006

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

The Home and Family Society (Incorporated) is a Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. The financial statements of the Society are a general purpose report which has been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice.

Measurement Base

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historical cost basis are followed by the Society.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

Investments are stated at cost.

- Fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.
- Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis on all tangible fixed assets other than the freehold land, at rates calculated to allocate the assets cost less estimated residual value over their estimated useful lives. The depreciation rates used are:
 - i) Chattels 15% to 48%, depending on category
 - ii) Leasehold Improvements 4% DV
- The financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis.
- The Society qualifies for differential reporting as it is not publicly accountable, and it is not large as defined in the Framework for Differential Reporting. The Society has taken full advantage of all differential reporting exemptions.
- Operating leases are those which all the risks and benefits are substantially retained by the lessor. Lease payments are expensed in the periods the amounts are payable.
- Inventories are valued by the Executive Committee at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a first-in-first-out basis. Where necessary, the Executive Committee have provided for slow-moving and obsolete stock, in order to better reflect net realisable values.
- Grants and donations are recognised as operating revenue on a cash basis, unless specific conditions attach to a grant and repayment of the grant is required where these conditions are not met

Changes in Accounting Policy

There have been no material changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those used in previous years.

Segment Reporting

The Society has only one activity as a non-profit organisation for the Protection of Home and Family. All operations are carried out within New Zealand.

Auditor's report

To the Members of Home and Family Society (Incorporated)

We have audited the financial statements on pages 7 and 8. The financial statements provide information about the past financial performance and financial position of the Society as at 31 March 2006. This information is stated in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 9.

Executive Committee's Responsibilities

The Executive Committee is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements which give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Society as at 31 March 2006 and of the results of operations for the year ended on that date.

Auditors' Responsibilities

It is our responsibility to express an independent opinion on the financial statements presented by the Executive Committee and report on our opinion to you.

Basis of Opinion

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes assessing:

- the significant estimates and judgements made by the Executive Committee in the preparation of the financial statements; and
- whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Society's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in New Zealand. We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary, in order to provide us with significant evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatements whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion, we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Other than in our capacity as auditors we have no relationship with or interests in the Society.

Qualified Opinion

In common with other organisations of a similar nature, control over donation income prior to it being recorded is limited and there are no practical audit procedures to determine the effect of this limited control.

In this respect alone we have not obtained all the information and explanations that we have required.

In our opinion, except for the possible effect of limited control referred to in the above paragraph, the financial statements on pages 7 and 8 fairly reflect the results of operations for the year ended 31 March 2006.

In our opinion the financial statements on pages 7 and 8 fairly reflect the financial position of the Society as at 31 March 2006.

Our audit was completed on 28 July 2006 and our qualified opinion is expressed as at that date.
